This past year my spiritual journey took an unanticipated turn. A little over a year ago by an indirect invitation, I became a server at the noon Mass. I am not really sure why I was so quick to say, "I'll do it." Maybe my natural impulsiveness was given a divine nudge. If I had thought about it a little bit more, I may have said, "Thanks, but no thanks. That's not for me." For instance, my comfort zone is *not* sitting in the front. For some reason, I would just rather sit in back. I could easily have reasoned that I am already doing a lot of stewardship here on top of my very busy personal life. And perhaps my biggest objection might have been the fact that servers are doing things in front of everybody. I am not shy and I can follow procedures, but what if I mess up? I have a strong desire to be really good at whatever I do. However, in my personal experience I make ridiculous mistakes, especially when someone is watching me. (Seriously... I cannot read a ruler if someone is looking over my shoulder). Well...I am so lucky that I was open to something new and I just said, "sure, I'll do it," because being a server at the noon Mass has been a wonderful religious experience for me. Sitting in the front is not bad at all. In fact, it's good. It's very good. Who knew? Being in front and a physical part of the activity allows me to be more focused on

every part of the liturgy and the Sacrament of Sacraments, the Eucharist. When I am not doing a task, I am just praying like I always have with my Cathedral family. The team that makes this Cathedral of the Assumption Mass one of the best in town has been so supportive. When I have made my inevitable learning curve mistakes, they don't even bat an eye. They give me reminders and cues during Mass. They give me pointers and advice afterwards. I get more and more comfortable with each experience because it's a team atmosphere; it's not about us as individuals. It's about God living through us in our relationships with each other.

The Cathedral needs servers at all masses, especially the noon Mass. I am directly inviting you to join the server team. If not you, then maybe *you* know someone who may want to be asked but doesn't know it yet. That's what my friend Carmen did for me. (good call Carmen!). I'd like to end by paraphrasing a prayer that was written by Thomas Merton, who would have been 101 on Jan 31st. For me, it fits the call to stewardship:

...the fact that I think I am following God's will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that my desire to please God does in fact please God...and I hope to have that desire in all that I do.

I am the Youth Minister at the Cathedral on a volunteer basis, I lead Children's Liturgy of the Word during Sunday 9:30 Mass, I am chair of the Formation Committee and on Worship committee. Most of my time is spent planning for my Youth Group, which is for the high school aged youth in our parish. I want to make sure I am offering topics or activities to help them grow into their faith. I am there to walk with them in their faith journey and ensure we are building relationships with each other. As the Youth Minister, I see my role as someone who gives the youth opportunities to encounter God. This past November I took a small group to the National Catholic Youth Conference in Indiana. I let the youth and their parents know about retreat opportunities the Archdiocese offers for high school youth. I coordinate speakers to come in and talk to the youth. We have had people come in to talk about vocations, Right to Life issues; we had a couple come and talk about their medical vocation and treating people in Kenya, and being a young adult and being Catholic. Children's Liturgy of the Word is at the beginning of 9:30 Mass on Sundays for ages 4-7. I ensure that I know what the Gospel readings are for each Sunday and make the message relevant for them. This can be done

through a variety of ways such as games, acting out the Gospels, song and prayer. My main focus for Children's Liturgy of the Word is to help the younger youth start to the love God has for them. The main reason I am on the Formation and Worship committees is to work with fellow parishioners to help our parish to have chances to encounter God and to have a prayerful worship experience. Through the Archdiocese I have my Associate Catechist Certificate and Youth Ministry Certificate. I am working on my Masters in Theology through Loyola University New Orleans Ministry Extension Program. My concentration will be in Youth Ministry. I will graduate December 2017. I have also recently taken a position on the Teens Encountering Christ National Board representing the retreat communities in Kentucky. My main service is to the youth of the Cathedral. About five years ago the youth minister/DRE for the Cathedral was leaving for another job. We had an amazing high school group. I felt the calling from God to work with them. There were several times that I ignored that call. Finally, through prayer and discernment, I answered that call, and I have never looked back. I love the energy that our high school youth have. Our youth need to know they are welcomed, and they need to know God and community love them.

During the Year of Mercy, I want to be able to give my youth examples of the Corporal Works of Mercy and show them how they can practice these Works of Mercy in their faith life, school life and home life. I would like for others to see Christ in them.

My name is Rita Owens and I have been with the Cathedral for a little over 20 years. Before I retired, I felt very limited in how I could be involved, but I chose to be a Eucharistic Minister and be involved in the Repair Affair. I felt that being a Eucharistic Minister would help me be more of a part of the Mass, and with the Repair Affair, I would be helping a small group of others in fixing up a home that needed small repairs, and it only required one day out of my life. Well, in December 13, 2012, I retired from Jefferson County Public Schools and decided I could do more. So now, I am still a Eucharistic Minister, in charge of the Repair Affair, answering phones on Mondays in the Parish Office, working in the Soup Kitchen on Tuesdays, on the Bereavement Committee, and helping with the mailings when I'm called. Being involved means meeting some of the BEST.

Being a Eucharistic Minister involves an original training, which is about 4 hours, and then a renewal after that. There really was no training for Repair Affair, just be handy with the hammer, painting or whatever -- I have had a fantastic team and we all do it together for one day.

I'm usually in the Soup Kitchen from 9:30 - 1:30, but others might come in at 10:00 or 10:30. During the summer months from July to October, I travel out to Gallrein Farms in Shelbyville to get produce for the lunch program. I usually leave home at 8:00 and arrive at the Cathedral about 9:30 or 10:00. They give me a carload of fresh vegetables for free -- very generous people. Then, I answer phones on Mondays from 10:00-3:00.

I will be asked by the captains of the Bereavement Committee, Jackie Lydon or Linda Metts, to either make something or serve at a luncheon when someone passes away, but this has not been very often. I have worked with Hand-in-Hand Ministries down in Appalachia and Habitat for Humanity helping to actually build houses, and I am just drawn to it, so that's why Repair Affair means a lot to me. I know that the persons living in the homes need the help and are very appreciative. If I know how to do it, God gave me the talent and aren't we supposed to use those talents? Besides, I couldn't ask for more talented help than Ron Mets, Tim Grimes, and the others. I recently went to Jeremie, Haiti for 12 days to work, and I would do it again. David Puckett,

Don Cavanaugh, Gary Boice, Jack Lydon and others could share their experience in Haiti--great guys! I lived on a farm when I was little, so I guess the produce and helping in the kitchen just fell into place. My father was a very giving person, and his generosity has always echoed in my ear. So, feeding the hungry means giving others a chance to have a good meal and not starve. As far as answering the phones in the office, it was time to step up when it was needed, after Marsha Kahl's husband died, and she retired--after all, I get to talk with some interesting people. The Bereavement Committee does a fantastic meal because of the generosity of many who donate their dishes of food, etc. The families of the deceased are always amazed at the tasty food. And finally, being a Eucharistic Minister makes me feel closer to the Body and Blood of Christ. There is part of a prayer that I always say at the end of Communion: "My God, I offer Thee this day, all I shall think or do or say, uniting it with what was done on earth by Jesus Christ, Thy Son." I want to mirror what he did.

When Father Jeff asked me to consider writing about tithing as preparation for the Cathedral's annual stewardship journey, I didn't even think twice before resounding with "absolutely!"

I've spent the majority of my professional career as a fundraiser in the Louisville community, so I've had a little practice asking for philanthropic support, but the topic of tithing goes much deeper for me. 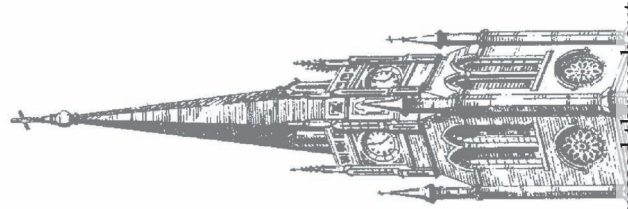

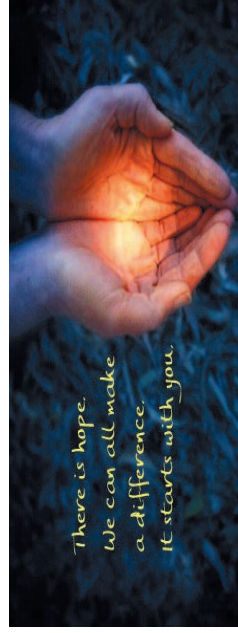

My first personal experience with the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults was when I accompanied Audra, my then fiancée, through the process in 2011 and the meetings with her and discussed the material afterwards. In fact, another member of the parish served as Audra's RCIA sponsor. Audra and I would discuss various questions that the RCIA session had raised and in doing so, by the grace of God, we both sensed a deepening of the faith. It was, through this process of accompaniment that I found myself drawn towards a greater personal participation in the RCIA process, which has culminated in my serving as a sponsor for candidates for full communion with the Church, and in my teaching several of the RCIA classes throughout the year. I believe my interest in this ministry stemmed mostly from my deep love and respect for the teachings of Holy Mother Church. It was some ten years earlier that I first found myself reading theological and spiritual works on the Catholic Faith. As a "cradle Catholic" I was amazed not only by how little I understood the Church's teachings but also the wisdom and logic behind them. Years of personal study and catechetical training through the Archdiocese of Louisville's Office of Lifelong Formation and Education have enriched my own faith and have better equipped me to help others

The EXTRAORDINARY JUBILEE OF MERCY

The Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy (Latin: Iubilaeum Extraordinarium Misericordiae) is a Roman Catholic period of prayer held from the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, 8 December 2015, to the Feast of Christ the King, 20 November 2016.

Like previous jubilees, it's seen by the Church as a period for remission of sins and universal pardon, in this occasion focusing particularly on God's forgiveness and mercy. It is an extraordinary Jubilee because it had not been predetermined long before; usually ordinary jubilees take place every 25 years. The 2016 Jubilee was first announced by Pope Francis on March 13, 2015. It was declared by Pope Francis in his April 2015 papal bull of indiction, *Misericordiae Vultus* (Latin: "The Face of Mercy"). It is the 27th holy year in history, following the ordinary 2000 Jubilee during John Paul II papacy. The opening day was also the fiftieth anniversary of the closing of the Second Vatican Council.

In prior months, it was stressed that the Pontiff wishes the Jubilee to be celebrated not only in Rome but all around the world; for the first time holy doors are going to be opened in single dioceses, either in the main cathedral or in local historical churches. The first holy door was open by Pope Francis in Bangui on November 29, 2015 during a tour in Africa.

Archbishop Joseph E. Kurtz officially opened the Holy Doors at the Cathedral of the Assumption in downtown Louisville, KY, December 13 during the 9:30 AM Mass. The doors, located on the north side of the sanctuary, lead to a series of seven stations, including the Cathedral's Blessed Sacrament Chapel. The other stations include Scripture readings, prayers, and reminders about the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

Outlined are the steps to mercy at the Cathedral that we encourage you to walk and reflect upon during this coming year of mercy:

come to understand the Catholic Faith more deeply. My participation in the RCIA program, I believe, even led to a slight shift in my career when two years ago I left a social studies teaching position to begin teaching theology to high school students. It is a great joy to share the teachings of the Catholic Faith to those who inquire. As we embark together upon our journey through this Year of Mercy, I am personally blessed to share my time and talents with a ministry within the parish that guides others to the sacramental founts of mercy given to the Church by Our Blessed Lord.

I am a Lector at the 9:30 Sunday Mass, delivering God's message for over 18 years at the Cathedral. Several initial sessions were held with the head of this Stewardship, Bob Murphy, who helped us with delivering our messages with ease from the ambo, projecting our voices, and carefully and thoughtfully delivering the reading's message. I would say no more than two hours of study and rehearsing your reading for the following Sunday is required per week, less as you become more adept and relaxed. I was drawn to this particular Stewardship more than 25 years ago while a member of St. James Parish, Elizabethtown, KY. With an emphasis on Pope Francis' call for the Year of Mercy, I think that by thoughtfully delivering the Scriptural messages to the assembled, I've been given a unique privilege to proclaim God's constant message of love and inclusion to all of His children in an inviting manner.

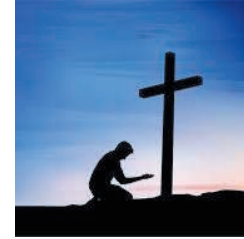
