"In Louisville, at the corner of Fourth and Walnut, in the center of the shopping district, I was suddenly overwhelmed with the realization that I loved all those people, that they were mine and I theirs, that we could not be alien to one another even though we were total strangers....There is no way of telling people that they are all walking around shining like the sun," said Merton.

This past March during Holy Week, Wednesday the 23rd to be exact, I had a morning meeting at the chancery with Archbishop Kurtz. I had a list with a handful of updates from the Vocation Office to pass along and another meeting to make an hour later. I strolled into the Archbishop's office ready to make my way down the list and be on my merry way. When I sat down, however, the Archbishop told me he wanted to discuss something else as well: my future. I had known a parish assignment might be on the horizon, but I was more focused on the items on my own list than what the Archbishop might have had on his. When he asked me if I wanted to start with my list or his, the answer was pretty obvious. "By all means, Archbishop, why don't you go first?"

There's a lot to be said for playing it cool, even and especially when one is not quite sure what they're doing. On top of this, one does not have to be a priest very long before you've seen and heard almost everything. Still, every once in a while, something so surprising happens that you can only tell your face to look normal and begin to wonder hurriedly what you'll think to say when it's your turn to speak. "Michael, I want you to become Rector of the Cathedral," was one of those instances.

Coming to the Cathedral was a great surprise, and is still something of a surprise. Still, it is a rare wonder to be here at all and the past few months have been an incredible blessing. I still serve as Vocation Director, two and a half miles from the Cathedral at the Vocation Office, otherwise much has changed since June. Almost every day someone asks, "How do you like it so far?" It is not easy to meet a question so simple with an answer just as simple. Let me put it this way. I have observed the following to be true in my life

and the lives of many others around me. When God asks more, He gives more. More of what exactly? This is where the answer is very simple: grace. When God asks more, He give more grace. God is asking more of me now, more than ever before, but He is also giving me more grace to work with and the same time. "How do I like it so far?" More than anything else, the past six months have been a very graced time in my life.

The Cathedral is a graced place. You know it even better than I do. Maybe you found grace when you came for the first time. Maybe you find it every time you come to worship. Maybe quietly you bless this place with grace yourself through your own prayers, your witness, and your presence. Thanks for being here. Thanks for your great hospitality and welcome. I'm glad to be here with you. May God continue to bless you for your kindness.

Whom We Welcomed to the Cathedral

In the past year our parish has opened doors to hundreds of pilgrims who came through the Holy Door of Mercy, which opened last December and closed this November, and to over 900 people who have toured the Archdiocese of Louisville History Center.

School groups that toured the Cathedral included: Sacred Heart Model School, Our Lady of Lourdes, St. Agnes, St. Martha, St. Stephen Martyr, St. Gabriel, St. Dominic Springfield, Holy Trinity, St. Aloysius, St. Andrew Academy, St. Patrick, St. Athanasius, St. Margaret Mary, St. Joseph of Cold Springs KY, St. John Paul II, St. Albert the Great, Pleasure Ridge Park High School, Jefferson Community College World Religions Class.

Others touring included Joy Tours, The Sisters of Charity, St. Bernadette Men's Group, St. Michael RCIA, St. Anthony Parish of Indianapolis, and passengers on American Queen Cruises that docked in Louisville.

Parish/School Religious Education Programs that celebrated Confirmations at the Cathedral this year were St. Agnes, St. Martha, St. Stephen Martyr, Holy Family, St. Therese, and St. Rita.

Archdiocesan events at the Cathedral included: Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Commemoration, Social Justice Workshop, Rite of Election, Ordination, choir rehearsals for Holy Week Chrism Mass and Ordination, the Office of Multicultural Ministry Pentecost Liturgy, African American History Celebration, Vocation Office events, Priests Council meeting, PCAL Meetings, Red Mass for those in the legal profession and White Mass for those in the medical profession.

Through March, Mass was celebrated here twice a month in the Syro-Malabar Rite. Each month there was a pro-life Mass at the Cathedral. Other groups welcomed here were Catholic Boy Scouts, Catholic Girl Scouts, St. Xavier (Mothers and Seniors Mass), Presentation (Ring Ceremony and Baccalaureate Mass), the Center Queen's Daughters (Mary's Day Rosary, Mass, and Brunch), Desales (Baccalaureate Mass), The Center for Interfaith Relations (board meetings and the Service of Thanksgiving for the annual Festival of Faiths), Catholic Association of Diocesan Ecumenical and Interreligious Officers Convention (prayer service and reception), the Louisville Orchestra (Christmas Concert), AA (weekly meetings), and the Kentucky Music Education Association Convention (choir competitions).

the month (will be skipping January). The Bishop Flaget Society (Planned Giving) hosted its annual members gathering in November, with dinner, a presentation, and an organ recital by Dr. Philip Brisson. Compassion's Fifth Sunday Collection for House of Ruth has raised thousands of dollars in cash and needed items for families impacted by AIDS/HIV.

Social Concerns

Our Lunch program averaged 150 lunch guests per day, with over 330 volunteers making that possible throughout the year. The Social Concerns Committee hosted a Voting Your Conscience Panel Presentation on the evening of the last presidential debate. We continue to have parishioner involvement with Central Louisville Community Ministries, St. John's Center for Men, and Nativity Academy. This year's Repair Affair team installed an outside stairway for a family in Germantown. Toys were collected for children whose parents were incarcerated. Christmas gifts were collected for Nativity Academy students and family members, and hats and gloves were collected for our daily lunch guests. The biggest and most unplanned challenge has been the devastation of Hurricane Matthew in Jeremie, Haiti, where our Sister Parish, Cathedrale

St. Louis, is located. We've received in excess of \$2300 specifically aimed at relief since the October 4th hurricane. That's in addition to the roughly \$1500 each month you continue to provide for the lunch program at St Therese Montessori School. The need is ongoing.

Formation

In addition to our ongoing RCIA and Children's Religious Education Programs, Formation offered many other opportunities for enrichment including the monthly Catholic Book Club, and Catholic Movie Night, a retreat at Mount St. Francis, and many events and activities around the Year of Mercy. Art and Soul, a long time offering of art as a means of caring for our souls and becoming more spiritual, moved from Monday night gatherings to Wednesdays. The 7th and 8th grades and High School Religious Ed Youth participated in a Water with Blessings service project. The Formation Task Force Committee has been working diligently on offerings for the coming year. Be sure to watch for announcements of offerings that include Bible Study and a Parish Mission!
