

MAKING A GIFT **N** OF OURSELVES



As Vocation Director for the Archdiocese of Louisville I have given what seem now to be countless vocation talks in parishes and in schools. Occasionally these talks have been for rather young students in the early stages of their primary school education. The subject matter remains quite relevant for these young children because the question of

one's vocation is endlessly relevant and in an important sense, a timeless consideration.

In the company of these young boys and girls I have sometimes begun my reflection by posing the question, "Who is the best person to be in the Church?" Answers vary broadly as might be expected, from Pope to bishop, priest to religious sister, altar server to lector or cantor. All good answers, to be sure, and for those who fulfill these ministries, we might say the true and best answers as well. Nevertheless, none of them indisputably achieve the rank of the best person to be in the Church. On this score, I think even Pope Francis would agree that another role in the Church bests his own. In the end, the best person to be in the Church is a saint.

The good news is that all of us are called to be saints. The French novelist Léon Bloy captured this well in one of his works when he remarked, "Life holds only one tragedy: not to have been a saint." Becoming a saint is not one of many Christian paths, it is the only Christian path. Though our estimations of what makes a life saintly may vary marginally, perhaps the simplest definition of a saint is one who becomes most completely the person God created them to be. While we struggle onward toward this end, mightily at times, our purpose as a parish community is to draw the necessary strength from God and one another to continue ever forward in becoming more like the person God created us to be. Our role in helping one another to this end is underappreciated. As the French poet Charles Péguy once said, "We cannot go to Heaven alone. Otherwise, God will say to us, 'Where are the others?'"

The logic that upholds the lives of the saints is the imitation of Christ himself. Such imitation is possible only if one thinks of life as pure gift received from God and pure gift to be given to others, and thereby to God in return. Pope Benedict captured this reality accordingly in his last general audience as Holy Father when he shared, "I have felt, and I feel even in this very moment, that one receives one's life precisely when one offers it as a gift."

This newsletter serves the purpose of initiating the process of reflection behind the Stewardship drive that will unfold in coming weeks. For all the important surface considerations to be decided regarding future parish involvement, such as What? When? and How Much?, at least one question can be answered simply here. Why? Because God is calling us to be saints, and inviting us to make a gift of ourselves. God bless you.

Please allow me to introduce myself. My name is Patti Birk, the new Business Manager. It has been almost a year since starting at the Cathedral, so I will not be able to say "new" Business Manager anymore. I have three children (Al -15, Cape - 13, and Hope - 11), and we belong to St. Stephen Martyr. After living in South Africa for two years, their names were inspired by the Cape of Good Hope.

There are way too many people to thank with my onboarding process. Yet, I must mention the generous staff, warm volunteers and many kind parishioners.

As stewardship is largely about sharing of one's self, Annette Roberts, the previous Business Manager, deserves a HUGE thank you! Annette was with the Cathedral for over 10 years, and her knowledge of the Cathedral is amazing, as well as her knowledge of procedures and internal controls. We were both fortunate to have the full month of February which helped with a smooth transition. Annette is always available for questions, and helps the money counters when asked. What a true testament of stewardship!

In general, we describe stewardship as time, talent and treasure. Because of stewardship, the Cathedral generously gives back to our parishioners, our community in Louisville by feeding the homeless every day of the year, our sister parish in Haiti, and other causes in the world. There are many ways to participate with your time and talent. As the Business Manager, I will focus on the treasure part of stewardship.

In addition to paying people, both staff and vendors, my other primary duties are ensuring that sources of income are deposited in a timely manner, properly recorded and maintained in a safe place. I will be at the Stewardship Fair during the last weekend of January and look forward to meeting you.

Stewardship through treasure (monetary donations, tithing, gifts, grants, etc.) keeps the operations of the Cathedral running and supports a multitude of ministries. Payroll and Maintenance / Facilities and the Homeless Kitchen represent approximately 44%, 14% and 12%, respectively, of the annual budget. Sunday collections cover 71% of operating expenses, which vary from week to week. That is why we ask that you and your family prayerfully reflect on your intended annual gift. Knowing expected commitments can build a sound and realistic budget.

Even though we budget for unknown expenditures relating to our buildings, there generally is a big surprise such as replacing an air conditioning unit, new hot water heaters or required upgrades from the Fire Marshall. Our Maintenance Team should be commended for maintaining our historic buildings and keeping them in good shape. We prefer to do as much as possible in-house. With that being said, we are constantly replacing aging equipment with new, more efficient tools, which ultimately result in savings.

Our beautiful Cathedral is 165 years, and we want to keep HER surviving, and THRIVING! In order to do so,

there are constant repairs and required maintenance.

We are all blessed with a beautiful place to worship and a Parish family that supports our greater community. Please discern about your annual gift to the Cathedral so Her legacy and ours as a compassionate community can be sustained



for centuries to come. It is a powerful way to show future generations what Stewardship, service to others, is all about. In advance, we thank you for your generosity.

It's Who We Are...It's What We Do

A Catholic Church, by its very nature and mission, reaches out to all.

Our Cathedral mission statement is:

Cathedral parishioners, in communion with the Archbishop of Louisville, are disciples of Jesus Christ and stewards of God's gifts to us. We commit ourselves to giving thanks and praise to God in Word and Sacrament, to engaging in lifelong spiritual formation in the Roman Catholic tradition, to embracing the unique role of a cathedral in the local Church and civic community, and to responding to God's unconditional love by reaching out in hospitality and service to all.

Our history of outreach on this site begins with the first church here, St. Louis. In the 1830's, Mother Catherine Spalding and the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth took in children orphaned by the cholera epidemic and started an orphanage, a girls school (later Presentation Academy), a night school for children who worked during the day, and an infirmary. The Cathedral's St. Vincent DePaul Society, formed in 1853, is the oldest in the Louisville area. Our current daily lunch program has its roots in the Great Depression when the Cathedral's housekeeper began making cheese sandwiches for the area's hungry.

Today, our Social Concerns Committee is involved in three major areas:

Community Outreach

through our Daily Lunch Program, Repair Affair and other housing initiatives, collections for community causes, a voucher program for those needing state IDs, crisis intervention for those in need of spiritual, physical and emotional support. We also are involved with St. John's Center for Men, Nativity Academy at St. Boniface, Central Louisville Community Ministries, and House of Ruth.

Global Outreach

through our relationship with our sister parish, Cathedrale St. Louis, in Jeremie, Haiti and their St. Therese Montessori School.

Faithful Citizenship

through our work in the areas of Legislative and Public Affairs and Respect Life Issues. We work closely with Catholic Charities and Catholic Conference of Kentucky.

Your involvement can be as simple as bringing needed toiletries to a Fifth Sunday Collection for House of Ruth, or signing up for a one-time Saturday in June Repair Affair project with the Cathedral team, or an ongoing commitment of a regular day of the week or month working in our daily lunch program.

Our Committee is looking for leaders who have the passion, creativity, and skills to help us do even more, especially in the area of Faithful Citizenship. Our goal is to empower individual parishioners and our parish as a whole with the information, tools, and support to be our best, lifeaffirming, compassionate, contributing force for good in our parish, local and global communities. WORSHIP

The heart of our parish community is the Mass. We come together in worship, to receive nourishment for living in God's word and in the Eucharist, and to lift up one another in prayer. That worship experience at the Cathedral often appears seamless, but it has many moving parts.

In addition to the celebrant, deacon, music director, and sacristan, there are many liturgical ministry opportunities.

There are also 14 members of our Cathedral Singers and 35 members of the Cathedral Choir, and Dr. Philip Brisson welcomes dedicated members to both groups.

The beautiful settings that lend to our worship experience throughout the liturgical year are thoughtfully created and tended by members of the Art and Environment team. New members are always welcome.


