The Cathedral is truly blessed to have a rich musical tradition represented at our Liturgies every weekend. The Cathedral Choir, which sings primarily on Sunday at 9:30 Mass, is made up of a diverse group of 35 members with service ranging from only a few months to thirty plus years in the loft. It is a big commitment to the Cathedral as Choir members average about 4 hours a week in their service to the Cathedral with required rehearsals on Wednesday in addition to Sunday mornings.

In 1998, the Choir was honored to be invited

to sing for Pope John Paul II at the Vatican for the celebrated Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul. It was the beginning of a choir tradition of traveling in the summer (every 3 years) to the great cathedrals of Europe. What an awesome opportunity to sing and share our faith in the great Churches around the world that truly reveal the expression of the faith of the Universal Church, all the while being keenly aware of the fact that we were representing this parish, the Archdiocese of Louisville, and our greater community. It has been nine years since our last trip.

But now it is time to celebrate, in the same way, the great shrines here in North America.

The Choir is thrilled to announce our traveling days are back, domestically this time, with a four-day pilgrimage, July 19-22, to our nation's capitol, Washington D.C. Our spiritual journey will include St. Matthew Cathedral where we will present a concert to people of Washington, a tour of the Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land in America, and culminating in a private tour of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, where the choir has been invited to sing the Sunday evening Mass. While we're there, we will also visit the great national monuments and have some great fun! A trip like this takes a lot of planning and commitment by the choir. The trip is only four days so we'd love to have you join us on our pilgrimage, it makes our trip that more meaningful to us.

Our goal, as on previous trips, is to leave no

Communal Worship

Communal Worship is how we honor and revere God by praying with others. We praise God, we express our love, we ask for help. A most important part of this worship is "we." We gather as an assembly to help each other in praying, and the central act of our praying together is the Eucharist. Ordained ministers preside at our rites, memorialize Christ's words and actions, and lead our prayers. How do all these services come to take place? By the efforts of many members of the assembly. Getting together to worship requires not only a time and place, but organization so that we give glory to God "in excelsis," in the highest.

We need to feel safe and welcome when we come together, and Ministers of Hospitality provide that welcome, worship aids, and guidance to seats and other facilities, and collect our offerings. Lectors continue the ancient ministry of reading from scripture as was done among early Christians. Our worship includes music, to amplify our prayers and increase their beauty, and Cantors, Choirs and Instrumentalists help us to "pray twice." At the center of our liturgy is Holy Communion, and Eucharistic Ministers assist the presider and deacon in feeding us. Servers prepare the altar and, with Cross Bearers, facilitate the rituals surrounding our celebration. Our Sacristan organizes all the activities of the ministers and guarantees the supply of the material goods for the liturgy.

Who are these people who minister to the needs of the assembly and each other? *They are you!* Search your heart, asking God how you can serve. Pray and consider deeply how your abilities and talents can help others, and respond to the Worship Committee who work to describe ministries, train those interested in becoming ministers, and schedule their activities.

The Pew Research Center found out. It discovered that 79% of Americans affiliated themselves with a particular religious group and spent an average of 19.2 minutes a day in some sort of organizational civic or religious activity. But the group is quick to point out that the minority of people are doing the majority of the work. Amazingly, 13.8% of people spend 2 hours and 20 minutes a day serving.

Jail Ministry

Although there are long-established programs of the diocese serving our prison populations, most service in the jails has been done by a handful of dedicated deacons. A much more comprehensive program is being established, which involves training lay members of the diocese to participate in jail ministry. Because of the Cathedral's proximity to the downtown jails, Deacon Steve Marks and those he has trained so far come to the Cathedral to take Eucharist to the inmates. The Cathedral is also a "storage facility" for bibles and other formational material the ministers use. Last month, after a period of instruction, two jail inmates were baptized and their records have been entered in our parish sacramental books. If you are already a commissioned Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharistic or if you have an interest in jail ministry in some other capacity, please call the parish office and we will be happy to connect you with Deacon Steve Marks.
