As we enter our final year for the Hail! Full of Grace, Capital Campaign, we will look back at 2020 with some bruised feelings, broken hearts, and acute frustration. We began our 3-year campaign with all the appropriate fanfare and enthusiasm fitting of a great Cathedral. However, as I look back, I do not know how we would have managed without the effects of a successful campaign.

This Campaign successfully brought our parishioners closer, we achieved better communications and measured response through parish engagement. Our Vision portion of the campaign, for capital improvements, has approached 75% pending pledges received on schedule for the \$2,815,000.00 pledged. We are depending on the fulfillment of those pledges, for the rest of the needed upgrades and repairs to be completed for the Cathedral campus. Currently, we are merely \$200,000.00 short of our \$3,018,000.00 Vision Campaign Goal.

As Campaign Chair, and on behalf of the entire Campaign Committee, I would like to convey our deepest gratitude for your commitment to the financial health and success of our parish through this Campaign. I am certain, providence guided some of the projects, and gave us the opportunity to reach hundreds of viewers per week through live streaming during this unprecedented pandemic. This Campaign continues to apply these committed funds to improve and allow our beloved Cathedral to evolve and to meet the needs of the parish as well as our community. In this final year, I request that you continue to stretch your heart, your mind, as well as your means, to push this Vision Portion beyond our goal with all the conviction in your heart. May we continue to see our many blessings during the difficult times that 2020 continues to present to our community and our parish.

Beyond the capital Improvements of our Vision Portion, our Legacy Fund of \$3,000,000.00 still hopes to receive \$650,000.00 in pledges to secure the goal for our invested Endowment Fund. It will be this Fund that will serve to provide the financial support for our campus for future generations. We are so close. This will be the required financial support for future generations in difficult times.

In addition to the financial goals of this Campaign, it is our hope, through communications, stewardship, and common goals shared by our whole parish, the community of our parish will grow beyond itself. The new sound system can reach further than the range of the new speakers. The Live Streaming and Virtual Attendance will likely be with us beyond the immediate future. While we have seen the return of some parishioners that have not been with us in some time, there are many that remain cautious to return. We pray for their safety, and their quick return to us. As we continue to improve the rest of the campus, I hope those who have not had an opportunity, may reconsider a way to support our Campaign as best as their situation may allow.

Finally, the growth of our parish is essential for its future. Please consider the coming weeks, as the best opportunity to invite anyone and everyone. Most of us recall the situation that drew us to the Cathedral. These stories are still so vivid. Perhaps some of us know someone who may not have been to Mass recently. Please encourage them to come to our Cathedral. It is the sacred and celebrated ingredient of our Cathedral. We are all welcome and we celebrate Mass together.







Lo, how a Rose e'er blooming

The year 2020 has been compared creatively to many things—some laughable, some that sadden the heart. Perhaps a rose,

beginning as a firm bud of promise opening to full bloom as a fragrant magnificent flower, is a more gentle approach as we review the unfolding of this year.

Roses are often symbolic for love, life, prayers granted, hope. They were the sign given to Juan Diego by Our Lady of Guadalupe.

The Rose in this Advent/Christmas hymn is Jesus:

This Flow'r, whose fragrance tender With sweetness fills the air,
Dispels with glorious splendor the darkness everywhere.
True man, yet very God,
From sin and death He saves us,
And lightens every load.

We did not see in January the many changes and challenges we would endure throughout the year. Nor did we know we would be asked to meet those needs without all the usual tools we automatically reach for in our toolbox. We opened up to new ways and learned new skills.

As a worshipping community, there were times that church was closed due to the pandemic. There were times during civil unrest when our campus was inaccessible for many.

Live-streaming of Mass has become a weekly occurrence on our own Cathedral Youtube Channel. During Ho-

ly Week and Easter, WAVE 3 broadcast our liturgies for the whole community on television. Between tv, Youtube and Facebook, tens of thousands of people were able to worship with us virtually.

As a parish known for our hospitality, we were not able to celebrate in all the usual ways Fr. Michael's time with us and give

him a memorable send-off. Nor were we able to offer a special warm welcome to Fr. Linebach. But both those events happened, and we trust both Fr. Michael and Fr. Linebach know of our respect and care for them and our gratitude for their pastoral care of us.

Although we have had several funerals at the Cathedral, we were unable to offer bereavement meals due to social gathering constraints.

An amazing team of volunteers reached out by phone on behalf of Fr. Linebach to talk with as many parishioners as could be reached.

There was no way to have the daily lunch program's annual main fundraising event, Lets Dance Louisville. However, thanks to the committee's creative efforts, the community awareness of the wonderful outreach of the lunch program, and the generosity of individuals and businesses, funds to keep the program afloat were raised.

Even though we cannot yet seat our daily lunch guests in Sandefur Dining Hall, nutritious bagged lunches are served daily at the back door of the hall. Vincenzo's Thanksgiving Lunch was served "to-go" as will be the Christmas Eve meal catered by Derby City Gaming.

Our State ID program was on hold for some time while government offices were closed, but has resumed,

Our last gifts from Social Concerns to our refugee family were chromebooks so that the children did not have to share the one computer for their online classes.

Our Sister Parish Committee keeps us updated on how

the community of Cathedral St. Louis in Jeremie, Haiti is faring with the pandemic. The clean water projects located at the school sites are crucial at this time.

RCIA is offered online and in person. We have had two adult formation retreats online. Our children's program is also of a hybrid variety.

Those young people who prepared to receive the sacrament of Confirmation and the adults who prepared to come into the Church at the Easter Vigil had a bit of a wait. Their long awaited celebration took place on Pentecost; First Eucharist for our two little ones happened the following week. Again, these were times for great rejoicing, just not with the usual receptions so all parishioners could join in wishing them the best.

Our Golden Stars, a most vibrant and active parish group before the pandemic, out of care for the safety of its members, has not been meeting in person, but did visit virtually the new Louisville Botanical Gardens.

Compassion is another group that has not been meeting in person, but still sponsors our 5th Sunday Collections for House of Ruth.

Our Prayer Group has been faithfully active throughout the year, and has been praying for each of us as well as for those special intentions handed over to their care.

We have resumed our regular schedule of weekend and weekday Masses.

We remain truly grateful for financial support from those of our community who are still in a position to contribute. We remain in solidarity with those who are struggling financially.

This year has not been a bed of roses. There is not one member of our community who has been untouched by the year's challenges. As with all of life, the burdens and blessings have not equally been distributed. Let us build up one another up and hold each other in prayer. And let us all look with hope to that time when we can again all gather together in worship, fellowship, and celebration.
