CROSS BEARER/CANDLE BEARER MINISTRY

Being a Cross Bearer/Candle Bearer is open to anyone from the age of eleven or twelve years old and older. Must be tall and strong enough to carry the Cross or Candle. Cross Bearers are needed at all Masses. A person who is scheduled to be a Cross Bearer would need to arrive 15 minutes before Mass. Cross Bearers are also asked to serve on Holy Day Masses at 5:30 p.m. During Lent and Advent, Cross Bearers may also serve as Candle Bearers to accompany the Cross Bearer during Holy Week and during Christmas Masses.

SACRISTAN MINISTRY

The Sacristan has three main roles:

Security: Sacristans are responsible for assuring proper treatment of the Holy Species, namely that of the Sacred Blood and Blessed Sacrament during and after the celebration. The Sacristan is also responsible for keeping the Holy Tabernacle secure.

Mass set up and clean up: varies slightly depending on the individual mass time. At every mass, the Sacristan is responsible for setting up for both Liturgy of the Word and Liturgy of the Eucharist which means preparing all the books, vessels, offertory, and incense when appropriate.

Mass Coordinator: Sacristan assists the celebrant with whatever details/duties he needs done. The Sacristan will check to make susre the altar servers are ready and in place as well as making sure the assigned Lectors and Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist are present and ready to serve.

The time commitment is a half hour before and a half hour after your mass time. That may vary depending on the particular mass you serve and how fast you work.

The only meeting requirements are when there are changes to the routine or when called for by the Sacristan Coordinator.

Requirements:

- Be a fully initiated Catholic
- Be a registered parishioner
- Be approved by the Pastor
- Wish to serve God

Ministers of Hospitality are called to welcome in the Body of Christ as well as protecting the needs of the assembly members preparing themselves for worship.

SERVER MINISTRY

A Great Privilege... Serving at the Altar
To serve the Assembly of the Faithful at
the Table of the Lord is indeed a great
privilege. Serving at the altar provides an opportunity
to assist the Celebrant who serves the Assembly. Altar
servers facilitate everyone's worship by making sure
that sacred vessels are in place on the altar at the
correct location, in time for the Canon of the Mass.
We assist the Celebrant by washing his hands in
preparation for the Eucharistic meal and by holding
the Roman Missal from which he reads the opening
and closing prayers. We participate in the entrance
procession at the beginning of Mass and the exit
procession of ministers at the end of Mass.

SERVING IS NOT DIFFICULT and guidance is provided in the form of written guidelines as well as personal rehearsal prior to first serving assignment, and experienced servers will be with you on your first time close to the Altar.

Please observe what the servers do during the liturgy, and imagine yourself joining in their efforts to facilitate our communal prayer. Ask yourself, in a moment of quiet prayer and discernment, if serving at the Altar is a ministry for which you are suited and which will give you great satisfaction. Talk to one or more of the servers who now minister to this special need at the altar and let them share with you what they receive for their service. SERVERS ARE SORELY NEEDED and your contributions will be valued greatly. Come join the invisible servants at the table.

To be eligible to be an altar server at the Cathedral of the Assumption, a parishioner must be in the seventh grade or higher, and must be confirmed.
